Pupil Premium - Reporting to Parents and Carers July 2019

The school is allocated money from the Government in order to address the current National inequality in attainment between disadvantaged pupils and their peers. Schools are able to spend this money called Pupil Premium as they see fit, however, we are accountable for how we spend it and the impact it has had on raising standards for pupils. We are committed to meeting the needs of all our pupils and this philosophy underpins all our teaching and learning principles:

- We ensure that teaching and learning meets the needs of all children;
- We ensure that appropriate provision is made for children who are vulnerable, this includes ensuring that the needs of disadvantaged children are adequately assessed and addressed;
- In making provisions for disadvantaged children we recognise that not all children who receive Free School Meals are socially disadvantaged;
- We also recognise that not all children who are disadvantaged qualify for Free School Meals.

We reserve the right to allocate the Pupil Premium Funding to support any child or group of children the school identifies as being disadvantaged. Pupil Premium Funding will be allocated following a needs analysis, which will prioritise individuals, groups, classes or year groups.

SENDCo has monitored interventions and has reported the vast majority to be high quality. Children are more socially and emotionally ready for learning.	<p>Nurture provision ran effectively with 10 children accessing the provision, 5 of which are entitled to PP. 1 PP child successfully relocated to another school and 1 PP child has transition back effectively into the mainstream provision. PAIR scheme implemented successfully with groups of Nursery and EYFS parents. Thrive continues to be a strength of the school's social and emotional provision. 2 cohorts of parents accessed Family Thrive directly impacting on 14 children. Breakfast club was run effectively with 31 children accessing the provision, 9 of which were entitled to PP.</p>
Pupils have many opportunities to an enriched curriculum supporting learning through real life experiences.	<p>8 out of the 12 PP Year 6 pupils chose to access the residential trip. All PP children in Year 4 and Year 2 went away on residential trips also. All classes have been on at least 2 trips out of school linked to the curriculum they are studying. Nurture children have accessed 12 further trips on top of their mainstream class ones.</p>
