### **WORDS FROM AN AUTHOR:**

### Embracing Diversity and Empowerment in Children's Literature: A Spotlight on G.M. Linton

In this edition, we're thrilled to feature an inspiring article by celebrated author G.M. Linton. With a passion for creating vibrant, relatable characters, Linton delves into the world of children's literature with a clear mission: to provide a fun, positive and genuine role model for Black pupils and all young readers. Her latest book stands as a testament to this commitment, addressing the unique experiences and challenges faced by young Black girls. Through her captivating storytelling, Linton opens a window to diverse perspectives, fostering a sense of understanding and empowerment among her readers.

Why I wanted to create a fun, positive and real role model for Black children - and all children - through my book and explore some of the issues, in particular, young Black girls can face growing up.

I loved reading children's books when I was growing up, but there were never any main characters who looked like me or who did the same things as I did at home. As a young Black-British girl, I seemingly didn't exist in literature. That was in the 1980s. We are now in the 2020s – a new century – but until the last few years, the situation with representation hadn't changed much at all. Research from the Centre for Literacy in Primary Education shows that the percentage of books published featuring a main character from a minority ethnic background has risen year on year but remained low at nine per cent in 2021. So, wider representation in children's books has improved, but there is still such a long way to go. I very much hope this isn't a phase, but part of lasting change.

Do we really need to see change and an increase in representation? Isn't a good story a good story no matter what the characters look like? Should we draw attention to difference – shouldn't everyone just be treated the same? There are of course many examples of classic children's literature – many of which I enjoyed when growing up. But Britain is an increasingly diverse society and children deserve to see themselves reflected in a range of stories, as well as reading about children whose lives and cultures may be different from their own. We live in a big world and children should be free to explore and embrace it. My Sunshine Simpson series tries to reflect the common concerns of all children right at the beginning of growing up, as they discover more about themselves and their developing personalities. Sunshine Simpson is ten years old, and in Year Five, when we join her in the first story, My Name is Sunshine Simpson. Sunshine struggles with self-confidence and her 'frenemy', Evie, only makes the situation worse. In the second

story, Sunshine Simpson Cooks Up a Storm, Sunshine has moved into Year Six. The story deals with the nerves of preparing to move up to secondary school, her desperation to have a phone of her own, and the ups and downs of having Best Friends Forever.

### BENJAMIN ZEPHANIAH

You may have recently heard about the passing of Benjamin Zephaniah, a revered British writer, poet, and actor. Known for his extraordinary contribution to contemporary literature, Zephaniah's unique fusion of poetry with the rhythms of reggae earned him a distinctive place in the literary world.

Born in Handsworth, Birmingham, to a Barbadian postman and a Jamaican nurse, Zephaniah's early life was marked by significant challenges. He grappled with dyslexia and left school at the age of 13 without the ability to read or write. Despite these hurdles, his incredible journey from humble beginnings to being recognised as one of Britain's top post-war writers by The Times in 2008 is a testament to his resilience, talent, and enduring impact on British culture and literature.



### **KEY EVENTS THIS TERM:**

### WORLD READ ALOUD DAY 7TH FEBRUARY 2024

World Read Aloud Day is a celebration of the joys of reading aloud. It's an opportunity for both children and adults to pick up a book and read aloud to an audience. Celebrated in over 173 countries, this event was established by LitWorld, a non-profit organisation, with the aim to connect people and communities through the shared experience and power of storytelling.

### **WAYS TO CELEBRATE:**

### Family reading time:

Designate a special time for the family to gather and read aloud together. Each family member can choose a favourite book to read a part from

### Character dress-up:

Make reading interactive by dressing up as characters from the book you're reading.

This can be particularly fun for younger children.

### Create a reading nook:

Set up a cosy corner at home dedicated to reading.
Fill it with comfortable seating, good lighting, and a selection of books.

### Storytelling chain:

Start a story and have each family member add to it, creating a unique family

### Themed readings:

Choose a theme for the day – it could be adventure, fairy tales, or science fiction – and read books related to that theme.

### Discuss the stories:

After reading, have a discussion about the story. This helps with comprehension and critica thinking skills.

### Invite friends or relatives (virtually or in-person):

Extend the celebration by inviting friends or relatives to join via a video call or in person, if possible. Each guest can read a short piece or a poem.

### Record a story:

Record yourselves reading a story and share it with family members who can't be there, like grandparents or cousins.

### Visit the local library:

If possible, visit your local library to pick out new books to read together.

### Create your own book:

Encourage your children to write and illustrate their own stories, which the family can read aloud together.




### **BOOKS TO READ ALOUD:**


### CHARLIE CHANGES INTO A CHICKEN BY SAM COPELAND

And right now, Charlie has quite a lot to worry about:


- \* his brother (who is in hospital)

### 1. Share a Compliment:

### 2. Help a Neighbour:

Simple gestures like helping an elderly neighbour with their shopping or gardening can teach children the value of community support.

### 3. Create Kindness Crafts:

Spend time with your children making kindness-themed crafts such as 'thank you' cards or friendship bracelets, which they can give to friends, teachers or family members.

### 4. Donate to a Local Charity:

Involve your child in selecting toys, clothes or books they no longer use and donate them to a local charity.

A disabled prince fights for his kingdom and learns the importance of understanding others. A princess finds the courage to rescue her friend from goblins. A girl steps into the world of a book, only to find what it means to be herself.



### LET'S FILL THIS WORLD WITH KINDNESS: TRUE TALES OF GOODWILL IN ACTION

In this uplifting collection of stories by Alexandra Stewart, children are introduced to real-life heroes and heroines who have chosen to act in kindness, even when they have been faced with terrible persecution, prejudice, disaster and illness. Aimed at empowering children who feel the weight of the world on their shoulders, these stories are designed to help readers make positive choices in their own lives by embracing kindness as their superpower.

Stories include Harriet Tubman's remarkable rescue missions to free enslaved African Americans; the French village of Le Chambon's protection of Jewish refugees under Nazi persecution during the Second World War; and the Fukushima workers who volunteered to clean up after the nuclear crisis in Japan; as well as everyday examples of kindness in sporting competitions, neighbourly acts of kindness and random acts of kindness towards complete strangers.


### **WORLD BOOK DAY**

World Book Day, celebrated annually on the first Thursday of March, is a special occasion dedicated to books and reading. In 2024, it will be observed on Thursday, 7th March.

The primary goal of World Book Day is to foster a love of reading among young people. This is achieved through a variety of activities and resources that support the six fundamental pillars essential for developing a habit of reading for pleasure. These pillars are:

- 1. Regular exposure to being read to.
- 2. Easy access to books both at home and school.
- 3. Freedom to choose their preferred books.
- 4. Ample time allocated for reading.
- 5. A community of trusted adults and peers for sharing and discussing books.
- 6. Recognition of reading as an enjoyable and fun activity.

A central feature of World Book Day is the distribution of £1 book tokens. These tokens enable children and young people to obtain a free book from a special selection of World Book Day titles offered by participating booksellers. Alternatively, the tokens can be used as a discount towards any book or audio book of their choice. To ensure inclusivity, versions of all World Book Day books are also available in braille, large print, and audio formats.

Here are some engaging ways to mark this special day:

- 1. Themed Reading Time: Set aside specific times for family reading. Everyone can pick books that intrigue them, creating a shared reading experience. Consider making a cosy reading nook with cushions, blankets, and some light refreshments.
- 2. **Dress Up as Favourite Characters**: Family members can dress up as their beloved book characters. This is a playful way to bring stories to life and encourage discussions about different books.
- **3. Storytelling Sessions**: Take turns to narrate stories or read aloud from a favourite book. This can be especially enjoyable with younger children, helping to ignite their imagination.
- **4. Create Book-Related Crafts**: Engage in craft activities related to books or characters. For example, make bookmarks, draw scenes from a story or create character puppets.
- **5. Book Swap**: Organise a book swap within your household. Exchange books with each other, offering a chance to discover new stories and authors.
- **6. Write Your Own Stories**: Encourage everyone to write their own short stories or poems. This can be a fun way to explore creativity and storytelling skills.
- **7. Book-Themed Movie Night**: Watch a film adaptation of a beloved book. This can be followed by a discussion on the differences and similarities between the book and the film.
- **8. Visit the Library Virtually**: Many libraries offer online story sessions or author talks. Join these sessions to celebrate the day and learn more about authors and their works.
- **9.** Use the World Book Day Token: If you have received a World Book Day token, use it to get a special World Book Day book or as a discount on another book or audio book.
- **10. Reading Challenges**: Set up a reading challenge for the day or the week. This could involve reading books from different genres, authors or countries.





### WORLD POETRY DAY

World Poetry Day is celebrated on 21st March. It's a day to celebrate the creativity and diversity of poetry, a form of expression that can be both enjoyable and educational for our children. From classic rhymes to modern verses, poetry offers a unique way to explore language, emotions, and different cultures.

Here are some simple and enjoyable ways to mark the occasion:

- 1. **Read Aloud Together:** Choose some poetry books and read them aloud with your children. This can include classic children's poems, funny rhymes, or even modern verse. It's a great way to enjoy the rhythm and sound of poetry together.
- 2. Write Your Own Poems: Encourage your children to write their own poems. It doesn't have to be complex; simple rhymes or free verse about their day, dreams, or favourite things can be a fun start.
- **3. Create a Poetry Corner:** Set up a cosy corner in your home where you can display poetry books, write poems, or read aloud. Decorate it with drawings or illustrations inspired by your favourite poems.
- **4. Poetry Scavenger Hunt:** Create a scavenger hunt where clues are written in short poems. Each clue leads to a small treat or the next poetic clue, making discovery fun.
- **5. Illustrate a Poem:** After reading a poem, ask your children to draw or paint what they imagine when they hear the words. This helps them connect with the poem visually.

- **7. Watch Poetry Readings**: Look for online poetry readings or animated poems for children. These can be a great way to hear poems read by different voices and perhaps even the poets themselves.
- **8. Share Poems with Family and Friends:** Encourage your children to call a relative or a friend and recite a poem they've learnt or written. It's a lovely way to share the joy of poetry with others.
- **9. Explore Poems from Around the World:** Use this day to explore poetry from different cultures. It's a wonderful way to teach children about diversity and the universality of emotions and experiences expressed through poetry.
- **10. Discuss the Poems**: After reading a poem, talk about it with your children. Ask them what they think it means, how it makes them feel, and which parts they liked best. This can help develop critical thinking and emotional intelligence.


### BLOW A KISS, CATCH A KISS BY JOSEPH COELHO. ILLUSTRATED BY NICOLA KILLEN.


